

Selfish or Selfless

(to use with Bible study, pp. 91–92)

On the board, make a list of everyday activities, such as meal preparation, phone conversations, visits, reading, etc. Talk about these. Point out that some activities can be either selfish or selfless, depending on the purpose and attitude.

Making Connections

(to use with mission study, pp. 93–94)

Make copies of this True or False quiz. Participants can mark the sentences “true” or “false” as the mission study is presented. Or you can use this as an introduction to the mission study. **Do not include the answers on the copies.**

Making Connections: True or False?

1. The best way to meet people is to go where they are: the park, ball games, coffee shops, etc.
2. Spending time with a homeless man is not worth the trouble.
3. Children can be helpful in meeting and witnessing to new friends.
4. One of the best ways to show God’s love and concern is by showing love and concern ourselves.

Answers: 1, True (also at work, by meeting friends of people you already know, and by being friendly); 2, False (give example of Tyrone, p.93); 3, True (mention the Knights’ sons, p. 93); 4, True (tell how the Knights make connections with others)

Optional: Special emphasis

As an introduction or a conclusion to the special emphasis, “Keeping Young Adults in Church” (p. 96), work in groups to decide on “5 ways to keep young adults in church.” Share together, and then vote on the three most important actions.
